

Solemnity of the Annunciation

We are truly blessed to celebrate one of our three patronal feasts. Our parish will join together to commemorate the Solemnity of the Annunciation, March 25^{th} . St. Mary – Annunciation (established 1902) was one of three parishes consolidated (2007 – 2009) into St. Ignatius Loyola Parish. As the parishes joined together building on each of their rich traditions we have maintained and expanded a strong Catholic presence as was the hope of our predecessors.

<u>Reflection</u>

"The mystery of the Annunciation to Mary is not only a mystery of silence; it is also, and even more, a mystery of grace. We must ask ourselves: What, is the real reason why Christ decided to be born of a Virgin?... Salvation comes not from human beings and their own powers but solely from God and his gracious actions. God intervenes where there is a human vacuum; he starts at the point at which, from the human point of view, nothing can be done. He gives life to the bearer of the promise in the dead womb of Sarah and follows the same pattern through history down to the Lord's birth from a Virgin...The salvation of the world is exclusively God's doing and therefore occurs in the midst of human weakness and powerlessness. From the viewpoint of the Bible the Virgin birth is in that last analysis a sign of what occurs is a pure act of grace on God's part." (Benedict XVI, Pope emeritus)

Today, we celebrate the beginning of our salvation when the coming of the Lord was announced by an angel. Let us pray in our hearts, saying: May God's holy Mother help all in distress, encourage the fainthearted, console the sorrowful, assist your holy people especially those who have gone before us seeking your love and compassion. THEOLOGICAL TIDBITS LEARNING TO JOURNEY TOGETHER AS CATHOLICS



This week we are looking at a very prominent part of the Mass....The Liturgy of the Word. This part of the Mass includes special readings for our consideration. It begins with the Old Testament (O.T.) {except during the Easter season, when the reading is taken from the Acts of the Apostles}, This is followed by the Responsorial Psalm, (R.P.S.) which is sung/proclaimed from the ambo since it is really a reading. The New Testament Reading (N.T.) follows the R.Ps.

In the days when Jesus lived and died the Apostles, especially St. Paul, wrote to the people of Corinth, Rome, etc. but today he would write to the people of St. Ignatius in Kingston, Pringle, Edwardsville, etc. He would tell us what we should do to take care of each other and how to build our personal Christian lives. Finally, we hear the **Gospel**, followed by the **Homily** and some other prayers.

The Gospel is the highlight of the readings. Have you ever noticed that the Gospel Readings are in a special book? This special book, The Book of the Gospels, is carried with great reverence to the ambo from which it is proclaimed. Since the Gospel is the climax of the Readings it is introduced by a sung acclamation. All that goes before prepares the assembly for this event. In most cases, the priest is the proclaimer of the Gospel; however, if there is a deacon present, he will proclaim the Gospel after receiving a blessing from the priest celebrant.

The words of all the readings are meant to be heard, then absorbed by the heart and finally, put into action when possible. This is where the Homily comes in. It is a help that guides us through the message of the readings, The purpose is to build a bridge between Biblical faith proclaimed in the readings and the real life lived in the community. The *General Instruction of the Roman Missal*, the book which instructs us about the Mass, tells us that when the sacred Scriptures are read in the Church, God Himself speaks to the people and that Christ, present in his Word, proclaims His Gospel. Awesome!

Diocese of Scranton Guidelines for Public Masses Revised March 11, 2022

On **Friday, March 11, 2022**, Bishop Bambera sent a letter to all parishes of the Diocese of Scranton, reiterating our protocols during this time of COVID. The protocols are listed below. These protocols are in place to protect safety, well-being, and health of all parishioners. We appreciate your cooperation with these guidelines as we continue to welcome people back.

FACE MASKS

The Diocesan guidelines continue to strongly recommend vaccinated and non-vaccinated individuals to wear masks inside for Mass and other indoor gatherings in order to protect the health and safety of all in attendance. We are most grateful for the cooperation regarding the mask request with our goal of protecting our neighbors. At this time and as long as case counts remain low, masks are optional. You are reminded to continue to maximize the use of space as much as possible.

DISTRIBUTION OF HOLY COMMUNION

All Priests, Deacons and Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion are to wear a face mask while distributing communion until Monday, April 18th, 2022. Mask wearing for distribution of Holy Communion will then be optional; at the discretion of the minister of Holy Communion. The minister must stop and sanitize his/her hands if direct contact is made with a person's tongue before continuing. We respectfully request anyone who wishes to receive communion on their tongue to go to the end of the line. The distribution of the Precious Blood remains suspended at this time.

HAND HYGIENE

Hand washing and sanitizing are essential in preventing the spread of the virus. It is highly recommended that everyone takes advantage of the sanitizers located at the entrances of the church. The Sign of Peace will be extended without physical contact.

LIVE STREAMING MASS

We will continue to livestream the 8:30 a.m. Mass for those who must stay home. The 8:30 a.m. Mass continues to be available for in-person attendance as well.

REINSTITUTING LITURGICAL PRACTICES.

As the virus numbers subside and hopefully will continue to be low, we are planning on reinstating the following liturgical practices effective Palm Sunday, April 10, 2022.

- 1. Resuming the accustomed practice of taking up the offertory collection.
- 2. Resuming the use of altar servers for Liturgies.
- 3. Resuming the Presentation of the Gifts (Offertory Procession.)
- 4. Holy Water will be returned to the fonts at the Easter Vigil.
- 5. Liturgical Music will encourage full and active participation.
- 6. Liturgical Processions will be reinstated.

<u>FACE MASKS OR FACE COVERINGS FOR CATHOLIC SCHOOLS</u> <u>AND PARISH RELIGIOUS EDUCATION PROGRAM</u>

Face coverings are optional effective Thursday, March 3, 2022, in all Catholic Schools and Parish Religious Education Programs within the Diocese of Scranton. Parents/Guardians attending programs in either Catholic School or Religious Instruction Classes are required to adhere to the same masking policy.

Once again, we are most grateful for your cooperation and understanding as we continue to do our best to end this pandemic. The decisions are based on the most up to date public health information. We are most grateful for your patience throughout these days. God Bless.



Seeking Nominations for Parish Pastoral Council April 2nd – May 1st

Please consider nominating yourself or someone you think would be a viable candidate for membership on the Parish Pastoral Council. We are currently seeking five new members who will serve for a term of two years with the option of continuing for two additional terms. The Council, which includes 12 parishioners, meets monthly and works closely with the pastoral leadership in guiding the direction our parish will take. All candidates must be an active member of St. Ignatius and at least 18 years of age. In the back of the church, you will find a table which contains detailed information on the nomination and selection process as well as the purpose and work of the Parish Council. On May 5th, all candidates will be invited to an information session. This is an excellent opportunity for anyone genuinely interested in the future of St. Ignatius Parish to get involved and to work with others in making a difference.

Nomination Process for the Parish Pastoral Council

Starting April 2nd and continuing till May 1st, the Parish Pastoral Council (PPC) will seek nominations to fill five positions for the fall. We invite and encourage you to become involved in the process, either by nominating yourself or someone you know who may help with the work of the PPC.

What is the PPC?

The PPC serves as a visioning and consultative body to the pastor and, in addition to the parish leadership, includes 12 selected parishioners. The PPC is responsible for planning and articulating the course our parish will follow. In addition to planning, the PPC works closely with the four Commissions, the Finance Council, and others to assist the parish in accomplishing the goals for Word, Worship, Community and Service.

How Much Time will I Give as a Member of the PPC?

The PPC meets monthly on the third Monday at 6:30 p.m. with the exceptions of July and December. Members are selected for a two-year term and may choose to serve for two additional terms; however, membership is limited to six years. Terms are staggered so that every two years some members will transition off and new members will begin. We are currently seeking five new members who will assume their seats in September.

How Do I Know if I Should Consider Membership on the PPC?

We are looking for people who are genuinely interested in the future of St. Ignatius Parish. We are looking for people who can work collaboratively with other parishioners in planning and identifying goals to meet the needs of our parish. All candidates must be 18 years old and active members of St. Ignatius.

How Does the Nomination Process Work?

You may submit your name or the name of someone you think would make a good candidate in a few ways. First, you can complete and submit one of the nomination forms found in the vestibule of the church. Second, you can contact a current member of the PPC with a name. Third, you can send an email <u>officemanager@stignatiuspa.com</u>. In the subject line note "PPC Candidate" and your name or person you are nominating in the body of the email. As indicated above, nominations begin April 1st and end May 1st.

How Does the Selection Process Work?

All persons nominated will be contacted to confirm their interest and invited to an information session on May 5th at 6:30 p.m. At the close of the session, nominees will be asked to take home reflection questions on parish life and return their responses to the Rectory by Noon on May 12th. The PPC will discern and identify new members at their May meeting, and members selected will be announced by June 1st.
